Replying to your memorandum of October 12th regarding the present state of health of the above named soldier:

For your information I quote as follows a report which I have just received from the Director of Records:

"In 'Canrecords' cable No. 3021 dated 15th August, 1943, the soldier, above named, was reported wounded in action 2nd day of August, 1943.

'Canrecords' cable 3164 dated 30th August described his wounds as 'shrapnel wound right dorsal region'.

Mrs. Mary Rose Arsenault (Mother), residing at Rogersville, N. B., was officially notified in both instances by telegram on the 16th and 31st August respectively.


No further in prmation has been received by cable and as Private Arsenault's wounds have not been reported to be of a serious or dangerous nature, it is unlikely that any further cabled reports will be received unless he becomes seriously or dangerously ill as a result of his wounds."

In view of the fact that Private Arsenault's mother has received no further word about her son, she can be assured that he is not seriously ill.

Articles of Clothing Re:



Dear Sir:

I have to inform you that the Commissioners have granted you entitlement in respect of shell wound of your right chest.

According to the reports of the examination held on you, your disability resulting from the condition is 15% in extent. Pension is, therefore, being awarded you at this rate.

The Chief Treasury Officer will send you a statement of your account. As pensions are payable monthly in arrears, you will receive your cheques on or about the last day of each month.

I am sure you will readily understand that a little time must elapse between the writing of this letter and the adjustment of your account by the Chief Treasury Officer. In the event that you are at present undergoing treatment and in receipt of hospital allowances, your pension will not start until the termination of treatment.

I should, perhaps, point out that disabilities for pension purposes are assessed on a percentage scale and the financial circumstances and occupation of a pensioner prior to his enlistment and subsequent to his discharge have no bearing on the assessment of his disability or on his pension rate. The pension rate depends entirely on the percentage of service disablement found on medical examination.

Section 24(4) of the Pension Act provides that no deduction shall be made from a pension owing to the pensioner having undertaken work or perfected himself in some form of industry.

Dear Doctor:

Experience has shown that a number of ex-prisoners of war have developed disease of the lurgs, possibly as a direct result of the hardships of internment. This Department is conducting months following his demobilization, and at the end of six months, unless the first examination indicates more frequent observations advisable.

This veteran has been requested to report to you for a thorough examination to exclude disease of the lungs particularly would you blease make the examination and conduct or arrange for any necessary laboratory procedures. A report is requested with possibly attributable to internment, be detected, your comments would be appreciated. If active treatment, or more frequent examinations are indicated, it is assumed that you will take appropriate action.

As present regulations permit these examinations during the first year following dischargs only, would you please verify the date of demobilization of this veteran, and, if the authorized period has passed, would you be good enough to refer this veteran to the appropriate provincial authority for examination.

Your co-operation in detecting and eradicating disease from the community will be mutually appreciated.

Service records show that you were a prisoner of war for a period during World War II. Experience has shown that, possibly because of the hardships associated with internment, a number of ex-prisoners of war have developed disease of the lungs. This Department, in conjunction with other health organizations, is most anxious to conduct periodic examinations to detect the earliest signs of any disease. The examinations must be thorough as the earliest signs are not usually noted by the patient.

It is proposed, with your cooperation, to examine you at the end of six months following demobilization and again six months later, provided that the first examination does not indicate that more frequent examinations are advisable. As it is now about six months since your demobilization, would you, at your earliest convenience, report for the purpose of this examination to a doctor of this Department, or your doctor of choice, taking with you this letter and the attached letter to the doctor. It is essential that these examinations be completed during your first post discharge year, but if the year has passed, would you report to your doctor explaining the circumstances to him.

You will appreciate that your cooperation is a matter of vital importance to yourself and to your associations in preventing the spread of preventable disease.

Dear Sir:

I have for acknowledgment your letter dated December 27th and would advise you as follows:

In order to be eligible for an award under the War Claims Fund, it is necessary to establish that you were held as a prisoner of war in a camp operated or directed by the SS, the SD, the Gestapo or the Leadership Corps; or, in the event that you were not held as a prisoner of war in such a camp, that the maltreatment you suffered resulted in incapacity for work and that such incapacity subsisted after your liberation.

If you believe that you can establish your eligibility within either of the above conditions, the Commission would appreciate hearing further from you in this respect.

When replying, please be good enough to furnish particulars of your service with the Canadian armed forces and also particulars of your internment as a prisoner of war.
